

Arizona Sycamore

Platanus wrightii

At 43 inches in diameter, this tree...

- Provides overall benefits of **\$76** every year!
- Reduces atmospheric carbon by **250** pounds per year.
- Intercepts **2,646** gallons of stormwater runoff per year.



Origin: Riparian areas of the desert southwest.

Growth Habit: Deciduous, growing up to 80 feet tall.

Temperature: Tolerant in the southwest desert. Cannot survive temperatures below -8 degrees F.

Watering: Requires access to ground water in its native habitat but will grow well in frequently flood irrigated urban areas.

This tree is regularly mistaken with the California sycamore due to its similar characteristics. The species name for this plant is after Charles Wright, a world-wide botanical collector (1811-1885).
